

Jaipur Literary Festival: A Feast for the Mind and Spirit



A 12 hour long ride, a whirlwind adventure, and a long weekend in Jaipur spent in the celebration of literature. the bucketlist was ticked off, the plans came to life and Elysian attended the Jaipur Literature Festival, 2024. As the students describe it, the festival was truly unlike anything they have ever seen. Bursting at every corner with readers, books, and authours with brilliant talks at every turn; the space felt like a safe haven of knowledge, wisdom, and inspiration for five days.

A total of 15 students accompanied by Mr. Shabir Shah as the faculty, started with their journey towards the city of Jaipur on the morning of February 1st. After a long day of travel, the group reached the Mohandas Aashram, which was their residing place for the next 4 days. The next morning we reached Hotel Clarks Amer and spent the entire day attending various sessions, enjoying the art displays and the variety of food present there. Later that evening the group visited the Hawa Mehal and enjoyed the night life of the city before having dinner and heading back to the ashram. The two days that followed were spent in a similar manner — Attending our preferred sessions at the festival, exploring the city and then napping away the exhaustion.



Described as the 'greatest literary show on Earth', the Jaipur Literature Festival is a sumptuous feast of ideas. The past decade has seen it transform into a global literary phenomenon having hosted nearly 2000 speakers and welcoming over a million book lovers from across India and the globe.

Every year, the Festival brings together a diverse mix of the world's greatest writers, thinkers, humanitarians, politicians, business leaders, sports people and entertainers on one stage to champion the freedom to express and engage in thoughtful debate and dialogue.



This year, the 17th edition of the Jaipur Literature Festival hosted as many as 550 writers, speakers, and artists across a vast array of nationalities, as well as some recipients of major awards. The five-day literary extravaganza was based on the theme of STORIES UNITE US with the aim to explore the transformative power of literature, how it reflects society, and brings people together.

The festival witnessed the launch of several books, which included Nirupama Singh Dar's "FASHION, POPULAR CULTURE AND POLITICAL ECONOMY", presenting the idea of empowerment, cultural identity through the lense of fashion; Itirani Samantha's SHAKUNTALA'S DAUGHTER, story of a mother-daughter duo highlighting the struggles of women of the fringes of indian society, battling poverty, unpaid domestic work and sexual abuse; Ashwani Lohani's HEART OVER MIND, about his four decades plus insightful experience in the public domain, experiences that bear testimony to the supremacy of the human resource over everything else. Several sessions also addressed the importance of gender equal language and the impact of negative language as an anti-feminist, non-inclusive element, the need for language to change and evolve with evolving narratives, and queer conversations which witnessed the writers and activists speaking of who they are, the journeys of becoming and the power to initiate change as the boundaries of gender and identity blend and dissolve.

The wise and witty Sudha Murthy's presence at the event was definitely an unmissable session as she talked about her recent book, 'Common Yet Uncommon'. The book is a heartwarming picture of everyday life, it presents the quirks and foibles of ordinary people. She talked about her extraordinarily successful life and what keeps her rooted with her feet firmly on the ground.


'Uncommon Love', a heartwarming biography written by Chitra Banerjee, recounts the early years of Sudha and Narayan Murthy's courtship, their marriage and parenthood, and the founding years of Infosys. The narrative gives us personal insights into the struggles and ideals of the Murthys before they became the icons of business success and philanthropy. The book explores the interwoven fabric of their business and family and the values that have held them together all these years.

Shashi Tharoor presented us with some time tested aphorisms through his latest book "The less you preach the more you learn: Aphorisms for our age" co authored with Joseph Zacharias gives short and pithy life lessons on coping, surviving and succeeding. He persuasively shared ways in which we can conquer frustration and insecurity, further improving relationships with our friends and family.








Langda's deft manipulation of Omkara's mind results in a catastrophe that is every bit as gory and horrible as the first. A few of the speeches have also been kept, such as the father's admonition to Othello/Omkara that she can fool her father too if she can fool him.

Movie Screening: ONKARA

On 24th of February Elysian Literary Society held a movie screening for Vishal Bharawaj's 'Omkara', an adaptation of William Shakespeare's 'Othello'.

Shakespeare is a work that raises more questions about how to make it understandable to a broad audience, and Bhardwaj excels at doing just that. He took the aristocratic Venice and Cyprus and turned it into a city run by politicians and gangsters, a motif that appears frequently in Indian Cinema. Physical appearances of the characters played a major role in 'Othello', hence the casting in the movie was spot on with Ajay Devgan as Omkara(Othello) and Kareena Kapoor Dolly(Desdemona). Since the Brahmins are often thought to have fair complexion, Dolly stood in stark contrast to Omkara. Omkara's dark skin was a sign of his half-caste status; this also played a major role in alienating Omkara in the same manner in which Othello was differentiated. The handkerchief turns into a glitzy waistband, and it is the finding of this waistband that establishes Dolly's innocence.

Omkara, like Bhardwaj's previous adaption, was masterfully done and had a strong foundation in Indian realism without ever coming across as phoney. It is humorous and accessible, but it has the air of mystery that Shakespeare's tragedies are renowned for. Watching this wonderful adaptation was an educational and mindblowing experience for the students as they critically analysed the film and through it were able to understand the English drama better.




Monster




Book Review

The Quest of being a Student of English Literature in India

"If you're coming across words in books that you don't know of, read more books. You'll find out what they mean; don't mug up dictionaries." –



Said Shashi Tharoor in one of his interviews to the digital video publisher Brut India, pioneering in the area of e-journalism. Listening to Mr. Tharoor has always been an experience; an experience of learning; an experience knowing and growing. As an Indian speaker of English, always swinging between the American and British pronunciations, it is a troublesome task to establish ourselves on the spectrum of this lingua franca. Mr. Tharoor has been the epitome of being an Indian native as well as an English speaker for the naive generations of students, scholars and academicians. iargonistic form of speech. filled with humongous words, vividly narrated anecdotes and beautifully crafted phrases, leaves everyone in awe; often creating a golden ceiling that everyone wishes to at least touch, if not break apart. This ceiling is not of meanings so to speak, but of ideas. The ideas that we as 'literatis' wish to convey. These ideas however aren't that simple that they seem to be. The words formed by syllables, craft themselves into phrases that eventually form the makeup of a sentence and then we get a paragraph. These sentences, to some are merely a mode of communication, but for some is so much more than just it. They carry feelings. The feelings can be communicated; yes, they can be. But do they even? This dilemma is what a far fetched interior conundrum of a literature lover, a literati sounds like.

"To be or not to be, that is the question", becomes the forever motto and questioning becomes the forever act of being. This is what literature does to you; it makes you question. It makes you turn and toil; think and rethink; burn and boil; all together, all at at once. But what if this plethora of ideas and feelings is in a language that is not our own? What if it is the legacy of those who tormented our forefathers and brought an era of turmoil and atrocities? Feeling and expressing those feelings becomes a guilty job when your chosen language is owned by those who once owned you. This is what being an English speaker and a student of English literature is all about. Angrez chale gaye, inhe chhod ke chale gaye (The British left the country but left these people behind), often said for those who even choose to speak a word or two in this foreign tongue with vigour, interest and ownership. This ownership is often questioned. "Why English? Why not Hindi?", "Why a language of those who ruled us?", "It is a stunt to gain attention?", are just some of the pointless and striking questions that we are bombarded with whenever we wish to quote Shakespeare and not Premchand; Keats and not Kumar Vishwas. The decision of choosing literature studies in English has been a similar experience. The journey started from reading Frankenstein as a mere non-fiction and reached to understanding the profound evidence of queer theory between the creator and the creation. But what was always questioned has not been this vigour of understanding but the vigour of understanding it in 'English'. Options ranged from Mahadevi Verma to Ramdhari Singh Dinkar but what became the topic of Superficially it all seems very normal and usual to being a student of English Literature.



But the responsibility of owning this language and surpassing its colonial connotation has been a tedious one indeed. To make this language our own has become the priority of everyone who wishes to be referred to as an Indian speaker of English language rather than a mere angrez. This brings the idea of ownership into consideration. The ownership of this foreign language is the first goal that needs to be fulfilled and everything else follows. How has this ownership evolved with a period of time is a story that we all learn and experience throughout our journey of being a student of English Literature.

This journey may start from the English writers but slowly and very steadily transcends towards the Indian authors. Everyone who once drooled over Jane Austen's women characters eventually fell in love with what Arundhati Roy pioneered into making through The God of Small Things; Dickens' descriptive illustrations progress towards reading Amitav Ghosh and Salman Rushdie. This journey encompasses all sorts of challenges and moments of muddles. Reading about one's own land in a foreign tongue; another's land in the foreign tongue; foreign land, foreign tongue but an Indian speaker, everything mixes and matches and what we all get is an amalgamation of what flowers as an experience. This experience is often surrounded by an enigma of judgement. This judgement forever and always scaffolds us; during writing; reading; understanding; analysing; and critiquing. Are we even qualified enough to question the foreign tongue? Or are we even qualified enough to understand it in the first place? Such questions remain omnipresent and need to be overlooked with confidence and enthusiasm. What Raja Rao presented through Kanthapura becomes a motto: "we cannot write like them, we should not. We have our own tempo and we rush with our thoughts as well as our speech". And this is what keeps every Indian student of English literature going; the quest of owning a language that is thought to be owned by those who once owned us.



पाताल टी: पहाडों की कहानियां बड़े पर्दे पर्।

उत्तराखण्ड के लोक में बहुत से किस्से-कहानियाँ हैं जिसके माध्यम से यहाँ की परि कल्पना का आधार रही। जब हम वर्ल्ड सिनेमा देखते हैं और उत्तराखण्ड के देख कर बेहद निराशा महसूस होने लगी थी तो विचार आया कि क्यों न हम एक अंतरराष्ट्रीय स्तर की एक फ़िल्म बनाएं जो उत्तराखण्ड की फिल्मों और सिनेमा के अलग पहचान मिल सके जिससे यहाँ की नैसर्गिक खूबसूरती के साथ-साथ यहाँ की गया क्योंकि यह लगभग 60-70 वर्ष पुराने कालखंड को प्रतिबिंबित करता है और तोड़ना चाह रहे थे। दुनियां में सिनेमा चाहें किसी भी भाषा में बने उसका फिल्मांकन और कथ्य महत्वपूर्ण होता है। क्योंकि फ़िल्म की पूरी पृष्ठभूमि उच्च हिमालयी क्षेत्र

इसके लिए गोपेश्वर की अक्षत नाट्य संस्था से सम्पर्क कर पात्रों का चयन और प्रशिक्षण दिया गया। नीति घाटी के गाँव कोसा,गमसाली आदि के लोगों के साथ-साथ एक्सिक्यूटिव प्रोड्यूसर गजेन्द्र रौतेला और लाइन प्रोड्युसर रजत बर्त्वाल को कोविड लॉकडाउन के कारण सामग्री जुटाने में बेहद परेशानियों का सामना करना पडा। यहाँ तक कि विशेष अनुमति लेकर 24 घण्टे के भीतर दिल्ली से शूटिंग के लिए कैमरे,लेंस आदि जैसी महत्वपूर्ण सामग्री को एकत्र कर लाना रहा जिसे सिनेमेटोग्राफर दिव्यांशु रौतेला ने पूरा किया। फिल्मांकन के लिए क्षेत्र पहले से ही चिन्हित किया गया था, जिसके लिए नीति घाटी और रुद्रनाथ घाटी का निर्देशक संतोष रावत और लाइन प्रोड्यूसर रजत बर्त्वाल द्वारा पहले ही कई बार जाकर रेकी कर ली गई थी। मौसमानुकूल धूप,पानी,बादल,घास का रंग और कौओं की उपलब्धता आदि का बेहद बारीकी से अनुमान किया गया था खूबसूरती और जीवंतता के साथ फिल्माया जा सके।

फ़िल्म के अधिकांश दृश्यों की मांग के अनुसार उच्च हिमालयी क्षेत्र में लगभग 3000 मीटर से 4000 मीटर तक की ऊँचाई के आसपास की पहाड़ियों पर इसके दृश्य फिल्माए जाने थे, जहाँ पहुंचना किसी चुनौती से कम नहीं था। हर दिन बेहद मुश्किल से ढीले पत्थरों की खड़ी चढ़ाई पार करना पूरी टीम के लिए बेहद कठिन काम रहा। स्थानीय मौसम को ध्यान में रखते हुए प्रत्येक दिन सुबह लगभग 4 बजे से चढ़ाई चढ़ना शुरू कर दीया जाता था तािक दोपहर तक बादलों के आने से पहले शूटिंग पूरी हो सके क्योंकि पूरी फिल्म में प्राकृतिक प्रकाश महत्वपूर्ण भूमिका निभाता है। इसके अतिरिक्त उच्च हिमालयी क्षेत्र में कैमरे सहित और अन्य इलेक्ट्रॉनिक उपकरणों की बैट्टी ठंड के कारण बेहद कम वक्त के लिए ही चल पाती थी जिसके लिए इतनी ऊंचाई पर एक तकनीकी जुगाड़ बनाकर इसका समाधान किया गया, जिसमें पहाड़ी के निचले भाग में धूप वाले स्थान और सोलर की प्लेटें रखी गई, और ऊंचाई वाले स्थान पर कंप्यूटर के यूO पीOएसO के साथ उन्हे जोड़कर इन उपकरणों को थोड़ी-थोड़ी देरके लिए चार्ज करा जाता था और फिर शूट करते समय लगातार इसी प्रक्रिया से काम पूरा किया गया। पूरी टीम का यह एक अलग तरह का अनुभव रहा। इसके अतिरिक्त सीमांत क्षेत्र होने के कुछ विभागों की लिखित अनुमित लेना भी जरूरी काम रहा। इसके अतिरिक्त बहुत सी आर्थिक चुनौतिया सामने आई जिसे फ़िल्म प्रेमियों और दोस्तों की छोटी छोटी आर्थिक मदद से पूरा किया गया। सबसे अधिक आर्थिक चुनौती उस वक़्त सामने आई जब इस फ़िल्म का चयन बुसान और मॉस्को अंतरराष्ट्रीय फ़िल्म फेस्टिवल में प्रदर्शन के लिए हुआ। यह जानकारी प्राप्त कर सभी को बहुत खुशी हुई लेकिन वहाँ तक आने-जाने की हवाई यात्रा के टिक के पैसे न थे। हर तरह से सरकारी मदद लेने की कोशिश की गई, हर संभव दरवाजे खटखटाए लेकिन मदद तो दूर कोई मिलने को भी राजी न हुआ।

यहाँ तक कि मुख्यमंत्री के दरवाजे तक कई बार मदद की गुहार लगाने गए जिसमे कई दिन व्यर्थ गंवाए। मिलने की इजाज़त तक न मिलने पर थक हार कर व्यक्तिगत सम्बन्धों के आधार पर कला प्रेमी गणेश खुगशाल 'गणी' के सहयोग से हंस फाउंडेशन के द्वारा बुसान दक्षिण कोरिया आने-जाने का खर्च वहन कर सहयोग किया गया।

पूरी शूटिंग के दौरान लगभग 18-20 लोगों की टीम ने लगातार 20 दिन की शूटिंग की, जिसमें पोते का मुख्य पात्र निभाने वाले आयुष रावत ने इन उच्च हिमालयी क्षेत्र की लगभग 400 मीटर तक पैदल यात्रा की जबकि अन्य सदस्यों ने लगभग 350 कि यात्रा करी। पूरी फिल्म के अंतिम रूप तक आने में लगभग बीस लाख रुपए की धनराशि का व्यय हुआ। फिल्म पूरी तरह बनने के बाद इसे मान्यता प्राप्त होने के लिए उसे अंतरराष्ट्रीय स्तर पर होने वाले लगभग सभी फ़िल्म फेस्टिवल्स में पूरे एक वर्ष तक भेजा जाता रहा जिसका सबसे पहला सुखद परिणाम फरवरी 2022 में दक्षिण कोरिया के प्रख्यात बुसान इंटरनेशनल शार्ट फ़िल्म फेस्टीवल से आया। उसके पश्चात रूस के मॉस्को सिहत छः अन्य अंतरराष्ट्रीय फ़िल्म फेस्टिवल में इसे स्थान मिला और सम्मानित किया गया। अंत में वर्ष 2023 में भारत के प्रमुख फ़िल्म सम्मान 'नेशनल फ़िल्म अवार्ड' में नॉन फीचर फिल्म के सिनेमेटोग्राफी के लिए राष्ट्रीय पुरस्कार देश की महामहिम राष्ट्रपति के हाथों 'बिट्टू रावत' को दिया जाएगा। यह उत्तराखण्ड के लिए एक बेहद गर्व और सम्मान का अवसर है।



As the waves crashed against the shore,


I could feel myself floating away.
